Woodley & Earley Lions donate 2 Minibuses



Readibus is a registered charity and has a fleet of 20 minibuses serving the Reading, Newbury and Wokingham areas of Berkshire. They are all designed to transport local people who are unable to use the public bus Prospective services. passengers just phone the

call centre and they are provided with a door to door service. Although the local councils provide some funding, it is never enough and therefore we decided to assist by purchasing a new vehicle costing £21,000. Naturally we asked that it be clearly signed with Lions logos to give us ongoing extremely good publicity.

The Bridges Centre is located in Woodley and has been open for 5 years. It provides care for severely open for 5 years. It provides care for severely challenged children aged between 8-18 years. They were catering for about 42 children but this has increased to 64 at times, due to the clubs they are establishing. It is primarily a "respite home", but the staff hope the children look upon it as a holiday home, and want them to look forward to attending. Originally the PCT provided the new Minibus funded on a 3 year lease. This ran out and the leasing company offered a good deal to buy out the lease. The Bridges Centre manager sought our help to do this. The vehicle sees much daily use and without it the Centre would be unable to operate efficiently. As with the Readibus, we asked that Lions logos be permanently displayed on the vehicle to publicise our club's contribution.

Government Help For Lions Club P.R.O.'s

A new project has just been launched to help all voluntary sector organisations get a fairer share of space in the media. The project called 'Community Newswire' is funded by the Home Office 'Active Communities' initiative and is operated by the highly respected Press Association in co-operation with Media Trust.

In 2004 I attended a seminar to launch this scheme, and I reported back that I believed it could prove to be a godsend for club and district PRO's in our organisation. However, three years on, I am still finding Club P.R.O.'s who are unaware of what it is, and what it does so the start of a new lionistic year seems a good time to offer this reminder.

Here's how it works. You send your news to a team at PA through a template on the Community Newswire website. You can also send photographs.

You send your press releases online through www.communitynewswire.org You will be asked to register and then submit your material within an online form. You can also contact them by phone at the Community Newswire newsdesk: Tel. No. 0870 124 0866

The Community Newswire journalists (over a thousand professionals have volunteered their time on a rota system) select the most newsworthy stories. They may also call you for more information. Around twenty stories are selected every day to go out on PA's regional newswires. Very special stories would be upgraded and go national. The reporters and broadcasters who receive the wire have free and unlimited access to the information. As well as being available on PA's newswire the community stories can also be accessed by professional journalists free of charge on www.pamediapoint.press.net

It is important to note that this is additional support for PRO's and NOT a substitute for well established personal contacts with your local journalists. But, for the really special story this can give us, The Lions, a much wider audience. This new system has tremendous potential for all of us in the voluntary sector but it is important that we don't abuse it. PRO's should also be careful not to devalue the scheme by submitting trivia. They should start by visiting the community service newswire and reading their advisory sections.

PA (The Press Association) prides itself on being impartial, fast and accurate.

That makes it one of the most trusted and reliable news services in the world.

Use it wisely and very soon the question "Who are the Lions?" will stop being asked.

First female District Governor for the Lions of 105D

History was made in 1917 when Lions Clubs International was founded in Chicago. History was also made in Chicago early in July when Lion Pat Nixon became the first female District Governor of the seventy Lions Clubs in Hampshire, the Isle of Wight and the Channel Islands, Dorset, and parts of Wiltshire and Berkshire that make up our District.

Pat, who has previously served as President of Clubs in Fareham and Portsmouth, and is currently a member of the

Cosham Lions Club, formally became a Governor of Lions International at the Convention in Chicago celebrating the organisations 90 years of community service. I wonder if she knew just what she was getting into? The D.G. Training Course was so intense with sessions running



throughout the day from eight in the morning until late at night. The DG's Elect were rushed off their feet and hardly had time to discover whether, as the song says, "The Windy City is mighty pretty!" In actual fact, it is, and on 4th July Pat at least got an opportunity to admire the skyline of the Magnificent Mile as she lead the British & Irish contingent in the International Parade along the road bordering Lake Michigan.



About 15,000 Lions took part in the parade representing almost 200 nations and it was, as usual, a great spectacle which would have multiple pistraction been even better if the BRITISH ISLES & IRELA Chicago Police Department had allowed the procession to go along Michigan Avenue in

the heart of the city but, in addition to the usual 4th July Festivities, they were having to contend with thousands of people from all over the States converging on Grant Park for the world renowned food festival called "The Taste of Chicago".

The International Parade was a highlight, but there were many more, for example the International Show with Glen Campbell heading the bill, the closing session with President Jimmy Carter giving an inspiring presentation, visits to OakBrook, the International Headquarters, Lions Night at the Ball Game watching Chicago WhiteSox v. Baltimore Orioles, or for me, personally, my meeting with the Nepalese Lions who recently conquered Mount Everest and, what many saw as the most moving part of the Convention, a recreation of the scene at the 1925 Convention when "Miss Helen Keller" was lead on stage and delivered her momentous speech challenging Lions to become 'Knights of the Blind in the Crusade against Darkness'.

It is a happy coincidence that this year, when we welcome our first woman District Governor, also marks the twentieth anniversary of the first woman joining Lions Clubs. "Women are the fastest growing demographic group within Lions Clubs", says 2006-2007 International President Jimmy Ross. "As I have travelled the world, I have seen how our clubs and our communities benefit when women play an active part in Lions Clubs".

It was only fitting then that our new International President, Mahendra Amarasuriya of Sri Lanka, closed the conference by enumerating his "Challenges" for the coming year which include building up our membership with priority going to women and men in their 40's, and making a huge effort to revitalise the Leo Movement as a training ground for future lions members. International Conventions are great events and often very inspiring so, if you were unable to be in Chicago, perhaps you should start thinking now about going to the next one in Bangkok in 2008.
