Early on Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> November Lions from the four Districts surrounding London started assembling for this years Lord Mayors Show in the City of London. Fingers were crossed that the terrible weather which had blighted the 2008 Show would not recur.

No such luck! The heavens opened and the rain poured down on the combined efforts of Districts 105D, A, EA, and SE who, optimistically had chosen an open top bus as the centre piece of our entry!

Rt. Hon. The Lord Mayor Nick Anstee, 682<sup>nd</sup> Lord Mayor of London, had chosen "Pitch Perfect" as his theme which is designed to bring Music and Sporting Opportunities to young people from disadvantaged backgrounds. Picking up the emphasis on Youth the Lions had responded with a delegation made up of Leos, Young Leaders in Service, and a Jazz Band from Charterhouse School.



With half a million members of the public along the route, as well as some 3 million viewers at home and another 10 million worldwide it was important that the whole assembly presented a lasting image. And they did! Led by our mascot, Roary, on a Golf Buggy and followed by the Double Decker Bus, fifty Lions and twenty young members, all dressed in royal blue fleeces and yellow caps, set off as part of 6000

participants in a procession that was over three miles long. The delegation of Lions from 105D was led by District Governor Judith Goodchild, ably assisted by 2<sup>nd</sup> VDG Ron Twining and Lion Ann Twining in a 'Lion Suit'! Despite the weather conditions the Lions from "D" presented a proud and professional image as they marched through the City, and their good humour was rewarded by the tremendous reception all round the route. Even after three and a half hours the Aldermen of the City were still in the grandstand at the Mansion House to welcome the Lions back.

District Governor Judith thanked everyone for their participation and took time to welcome four Young Leaders in Service, who had been sponsored by Crofton Lions, as an important part of the "D"lightful Delegation. They were Victoria Goodsell, Samantha Harvey, Holly Chambers and Rebecca Chambers whose considered judgement of the day was summed up in five words... "Awesome, Amazing, Wet <u>but</u> Fun!" By providing resources, Lions Clubs worldwide have been able to restore the sight to over 27 million people and have built or expanded more than 300 eye hospitals and clinics, training 345,000 ophthalmic nurses.
